

Herger Appointed Chairman of Ways and Means Subcommittee on Health

(Washington, D.C) – Congressman Wally Herger (R-CA) today was appointed to be the Chairman of the Ways & Means Subcommittee on Health for the 112th Congress. Herger held the position of Ranking Member on the Health Subcommittee in the 111th Congress. With this appointment, Herger will help lead the effort to repeal ObamaCare and to advance reforms that will actually lower health care costs and increase access to quality care.
